Using Catch-Up Funding

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- Schools should use this funding for specific activities to support their pupils to catch up for lost teaching over the previous months, in line with the curriculum expectations for the next academic year.
- While schools can use their funding in a way that suits their cohort and circumstances, they are expected to use this funding for specific activities which will help pupils catch up on missed education.

Education Endowment Foundation (EEF) have published a paper, coronavirus (COVID19) Support Guide for Schools. The key recommendations are:

- Teaching and Whole-school Strategies
 - Supporting great teaching
 - Pupil assessment and feedback
 - Transition support
- Targeted Approaches
 - One to one and small group tuition
 - Intervention programmes
 - Extended school time
- Wider Strategies
 - Supporting parent and carers
 - Access to technology
 - Summer support

Accountability

- School leaders must be able to show they are using the funding to resume teaching a normal curriculum as quickly as possible following partial or full school closure.
- Governors and trustees should scrutinise schools' approaches to catch-up from September 2020, including their plans for and use of catch-up funding. This should include consideration of whether schools are spending this funding in line with their catch-up priorities, and ensuring appropriate transparency for parents.

- The majority of children continued to access reading materials during lockdown, data would suggest this area of learning was least affected.
- The least able readers have been affected more.

Non-core Subjects

- Gaps in knowledge where whole units of work have not been taught.
- Essential to our children they have missed out on educational visits where the children get hands on experience of the learning.
- Due to lockdown the children have not been able to access swimming lessons

• SEND pupils have been more anxious returning to school
